We as a local have had a great year. Our membership has grown to over 3900 members and as I write this most of them are working.

We are dealing with some issues in our negotiations with the C.O.P.E staff. I want our members to know that at the start of this pandemic, we did not know how to keep everyone safe. Our office staff worked a day on and a day off for almost three weeks. They were all paid three full weeks' pay. Not one staff member of C.O.P.E. was docked a single hour. If a C.O.P.E. member was to get COVID-19, I would pay them until they are able to return to work.

During this pandemic, our staff of officers and instructors picked up a broom, mop or a paint brush and did a massive cleanup overhaul of the shop, weld shop, and ramp. We also built two new storage rooms.

Success Story: Our Local was awarded our 2nd K.P.I award from the international (Key Performance Indicators), a system to rate how we are running our local.

It is with a sad heart that I inform the membership that our member's Christmas lunch is cancelled in 2020. Our kid's Christmas party is also cancelled. Hence, it is not right for our staff to have a dinner party. It is also cancelled.









We have had jurisdictional issues all year long with E.P.S.C.A. and the M.W. Funny how everybody wants to be an Ironworker when the work is on the ground. We have won most attacks on our work but it is expensive - lawyers make a good buck.

I want each and every member to know that I am so grateful to be given the opportunity to represent this Local and its membership for this term and the pride I feel when someone asks me what I do for a living. I get to tell them I represent the hardest working men and women in construction, the Ironworkers.

It is with a warm heart that my family and I wish all members and their families a Merry Christmas, Happy New Year or whatever holiday you may be celebrating.



APPRENTICE COORDINATOR/B AGENT'S REPORT

Ironworkers have proven to be a resilient bunch and have fared pretty well in spite of the uncertain times of 2020. You would think that work would have slowed down due to the pandemic restrictions but the demand for new members has been off the charts. Most years we will bring in 50 to 100 new Apprentices. This year we signed up 300 before October and currently have a total of 725 registered Apprentices. This is the highest number ever.

With more Apprentices there is a need for more classes. There is a long waiting list for Trade School right now so please be patient if you are waiting to be scheduled for class. There are currently 191 on the waiting list for Ironworker Basic and 219 on the list for Rodworker Basic. For someone that starts their career during booming times, it is easy to think that work will always be plentiful. But construction tends to come in waves, there are busy times & there are slow times. It is important to prepare for the slow times while the work is busy.






MOTORCYCLE CLUB: UPDATE ON PAY-FORWARD DONATIONS




