## PRESIDENT REPORT

Dear Brothers, Sisters and Members of Local 721,

On behalf of the Officers, Training and our Administrative staff, my family and I **would like** to thank everyone for another extraordinary year.

Work wise our membership has once again seen an unexpected increase in working hours with the exception of the reinforcing sector. On the rod patch we have seen a dramatic decrease in working hours (approximately 30-35% drop). We expect the slowdown in the rod patch to continue for the next 12-16 months. Even with that, it was still another record

year for the Local. On a bright note all other sectors

in the Iron side are doing very well. Along with all the other Officers and Staff I would like to thank our membership for their professionalism shown on job sites.

Once more the work situation still looks very good in Ontario; we do not anticipate much will change as many upcoming projects have been in the planning stages for many years. The major concern here would be how interest rates affect the ICI side or even construction



sector as a whole. We have seen some projects delayed, postponed or even cancelled but believe our membership's

working hours will remain fairly steady for the next 24-36 months.

We are fortunate in Ontario to have large federally and provincially sponsored projects that will keep our members busy. Multiple Highway expansions, two multibillion rapid transit projects i.e., Ontario Line -CA\$ 10.9 billion for this 15.5-kilometre (9.6 mi) line which they hoped to complete this project by 2027, a completion date that had already been revised to 2030, multiple hospital and retirement homes projects, numerous school expansions and upgrades, and ICI projects including multi sport facilities upgrades and expansions, Toronto is one of the host cities for FIFA World cup 2026, and the recently announced extension to some our of nuclear reactors and including Small Modular Nuclear Reactor projects.

As the Bank of Canada continues to fight inflation by increasing the federal Bank rates we ask our membership to be careful with their money. We have hopefully seen the end of interest rate increases as inflation numbers were decreasing into September/October 2023. These increases have consequences for our membership

and their families who are seeing their finances stretched on increased borrowing costs for items like cars, mortgages and increased food costs. I pray for our members and their families who have been affected by all the recent strife and tragic global events that continue to plague everyone. There are other factors globally affecting us and hopefully the world can heal itself and restore a normal balance.

Hello Brothers, Sisters and Members of Local 721,

Work in the Northern area has been steady in 2023.

Honda has been busy this year with weekend work and a few small shutdowns. They are preparing for big changes in 2024 with the switch to a Hybrid model of the Civic, predictions are that 50% of Civics will be manufactured in the future to be Hybrid.

Newmarket has seen a lot of construction this year with a 1.2 million sq ft Loblaws warehouse and a new library in Aurora with many other smaller warehouses popping up in the Newmarket Aurora area.

Barrie continues to grow at a fast pace with plazas and schools in the new subdivisions. Also, there is major

work being done on the 400 HWY with new bridges which will keep our rebar members busy for the next couple of years. A few of the bridges are steel girders which will also employ some of our structural members. Wasaga Beach has seen growth in its housing as well as with a new school and a new state-of-the-art recreational centre built this year. There are also rumors of an expansion to the Wasaga Beach Casino already built in the near future. Collingwood has had a few new box buildings as well as a couple expansions to shopping plazas in the area as new condos are popping up across town.

## BUSINESS AGENT REPORT (Downtown)

Dear Brothers, Sisters and Members! Yet another very busy year is coming to an end. I'd like to start with some changes we have in the Downtown jurisdiction that came into effective immediately after this year's election. The Downtown we knew before has become divided. Downtown, now stretches from Keele Street in the West to Victoria Avenue in the East with the northern border line established at Eglinton Avenue. The rest of former Downtown now becomes Downtown Central which stretches from Keele Street in the West to Brock Road. Pickering in the East, North of Eglinton Avenue and South of HWY 7. The Business Agent for Downtown Central is Brother Shane Shannon.

Though 2023 proved to be one of the busiest years, we

had losses - Integro Building Systems, one of the major curtain wall contractors, filed for bankruptcy at the end of August, laying off a majority of their workers – about 25 members. Workers were paid until the last day on the job. And we managed to secure pensions and benefits for most of the members and will keep fighting to get remittances

for the rest. Liens have been put on three of the jobs and we expect positive results soon.

The glass sector will experience a substantial slow down next year, so my advice would be to consider your options, maybe look into Structural steel or Ornamental companies. Upgrade your skills if needed. If you let your CWB certifications expire, get back to the welding shop for practice - welding skills are in big demand.

On the other hand, we have a new company coming to town - Harmon Inc., who purchased Sota Wall. Though the curtain wall at 141 Bay Street, phase two of CIBC Square, will be installed without Ironworkers this time, any new jobs Harmon Inc. plans to self perform will be with the hiring of Ironworkers. We already had a meeting at the Union Hall and negotiated signing the contract.

141 Bay Street is a major structural steel project Downtown employing about 90 Ironworkers from Supermetal and GP Custom with E.S. Fox stepping in with glass work.

Metrolinx activity at Ontario Line, with 15 stations between the Exhibition Place and Science Center, is expected to bring employment for many Rodworkers, Structural and Ornamental workers.

Some ongoing projects consist of Phase two at Rogers Centre with Walters and Venture Metals; 1 Bloor West with Walters, E.S. Fox and mobilizing Bass Installation; Portland Commons project with Lorvin Steel, GP Custom and DOK Installations - the new company employing former Integro workers; Eaton Centre with Walters and Bass, and many more continuing.

I'll take this opportunity to wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year from myself and my family.

This site will include vehicle and battery pack assemble and is expected to go into production in 2026. Truss reinforcing work has begun at the Ford Oakville Assembly Plant in preparation for the new EV line and tooling installations to follow in the spring of 2024.

The Finch West LRT Line has kept many of our contractors and members busy throughout this year and work will wind down in early 2024 on this project.



It has been an honour and a pleasure to serve the membership of Local 721 this year and we have a lot to be proud of. Our members are dedicated, hard working and professional Ironworkers who know how to get the job done and I am proud to be a union Ironworker of Local 721!




